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Mission Statement

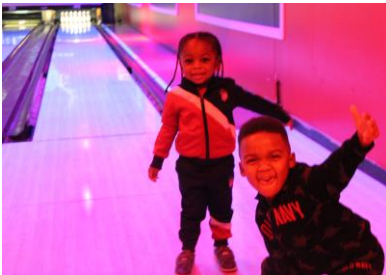
Gateway Hemophilia Association is a non-profit, community-based organization, dedicated to the advocacy, education and support of families affected by bleeding disorders.

Greetings Friends,

We are thankful for the financial and volunteer support in 2022. GHA provided opportunities to gather as a community and to provide the most relevant and effective resources. Most of our programs were in person, but we still offered a few virtual programs. GHA was fortunate to have 111 volunteers serving over 1,200 volunteer hours to assist our mission. Some highlights are listed below.

GHA offered 28 various programs consisting of 49 days of events. Five trainings over fourteen days, two advocacy initiatives over 3 days on a state and federal level, five fundraisers, six general educational program, two women's programs over four days, two men's programs over four days, one teen program, three membership meetings over four days, two targeted programs over eight days (Adult retreat and camp).
