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### Mission Statement

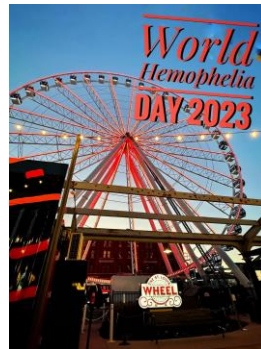
Gateway Hemophilia Association is a non-profit, community-based organization, dedicated to the advocacy, education and support of families affected by bleeding disorders.

Greetings Friends,

We are thankful for the financial and volunteer support in 2023. GHA provided opportunities to the community on the most relevant and effective resources for bleeding disorders. All our programs were in person. GHA was fortunate to have 122 volunteers serving over 1,500 volunteer hours to assist our mission. Some highlights are listed below.

GHA offered 33 various programs consisting of 59 days of events. GHA led the efforts in Missouri to support a bi-partisan copay assistance bill, which was passed in the House, but died before a hearing in the Senate. We also supported federal legislation supporting access to care for those with a bleeding disorder. We held five fundraisers, seven general educational programs, a three-day adult retreat, a women's retreat over three days, a men's retreat over three days, one teen program, four membership meetings over six days, and an overnight camp for kids 7-17 with a bleeding disorder over 4 days.

The photos below were taken on April 17, World Hemophilia Day. The St. Louis Wheel and the St. Louis Planetarium were lit up in red to bring awareness and a vision where all people with inherited bleeding disorders have access to care.



GHA members and staff advocated both on a state and federal level. Members brought awareness to our elected members of the harmful effects of accumulator adjustors.



Gateway Hemophilia Association's 14th Annual Walk and 5K was held in July! The money raised at the event was used to assist the overall mission to find better treatments and cures for bleeding disorders and to prevent the complications of these disorders through education, awareness, advocacy and research.



**Camp Notaclotamongus** tripled its attendance from the previous year's camp. The theme was Holidays. Campers had the opportunity to reconnect with friends and participate in a variety of traditional camp activities.

Our women, men and teen groups provide opportunities to make connections with others who are also navigating life with a bleeding disorder.
